A Guide for the Community



Criminal gangs steal and destroy property, sell drugs to our children and commit acts of violence and brutality that threaten the safety and security of our citizens. The city of Apopka and north-

west Orange County are not immune to this threat, and in fact have active gang members operating in our community and recruiting our children.

In his book, "Into the Abyss", Dr. Michael Carlie talks about how suppression alone will not reduce gangs in a community. The initiative must be targeted, comprehensive and collaborative to be successful, and it **MUST** begin at the grassroots level, with the entire community getting involved.

Here are some quick tips on how you can help:

- Start a neighborhood watch program
- Report graffiti of ANY kind to the police department
- Become a mentor for at-risk youth
- Report suspicious activity to the police immediately

What you should know...

Following are indicators of some gangs that may help you to recognize gang activity. Not all these indicators confirm gang membership.

SUR 13

- Use of number "13"
- Use of letter "M" - 13th letter
- Homage to Mexican Mafia

LATIN KINGS

- Colors — black and gold
- 3 or 5—pointed star
- Pittsburgh sports team apparel

BLOODS

- Colors—Red, Black, Brown, Pink
- "B"s up and "C"s down
- Dog paws made of three dots

CRIPS

- Colors—Blue, Gray, Orange, Purple
- 6—pointed Star of David
- "C"s up and "B"s down

APK

- Color—Blue Darter Blue
- Use Blue Darter emblem

What to do?

- **Observe and Report what you see**

The 4 "R's" of Graffiti...

Gangs thrive when they think a community is not paying attention. For example, they will paint graffiti on walls, fences, etc. If left unnoticed, gangs believe it's a sign that no one in the community cares or is willing to do anything about their activities. By knowing what to do, **YOU** can help keep our community clean and send our message to gangs that their activities and their graffiti are **NOT** welcome in Apopka! Here's how...

READ...Recognize that you're looking at graffiti. Whether it is or isn't gang graffiti it's not supposed to be there, so it's important to take the following action:

RECORD...Take a picture with a cell phone or digital camera. If no camera is available, draw a picture or write down what it says as best you can.

REPORT...Contact the Apopka Police Dept. at 407-703-1771 or 407-703-1772 and ask how to send them a copy or report where the graffiti is located. You **CAN** remain anonymous.

REMOVE...If the graffiti is located on private property it is the responsibility of the property owner to remove it. However, **PLEASE** contact the proper authorities before removing. Graffiti tells a story. If the graffiti is on public property it will be removed by the proper agency.
